This past year has also seen RPHS excel in community projects and we are very proud of all that has been achieved.

I would like to start by paying tribute to our wonderful students who are such brilliant ambassadors for RPHS and the dedication of the incredible teachers and support staff who have worked tirelessly right up until the end of this particularly long summer term. I would also like to thank the Governing Body for their involvement and support of the school. As you will read in this newsletter, wellbeing has remained a priority at the school for a number of years now. Our experienced Wellbeing Team provide the additional support some students have benefited from this year and this will remain a focus for us, as will literacy. We have also enhanced our Literacy Team and invested in a range of programmes to improve not only reading ages but confidence with reading and the Tutor Time Reading Programme continues to be a wonderful start to each day with tutors and tutees reading together.

Following the end of the public examinations and our own internal end of year exams, we have been even busier than usual this half term with residentials to Dunkirk and Kingswood, the DofE expedition, Enrichment Days, a reward trip to Chessington World of Adventures, Academic Review Day and Sports Days. We were also delighted that 150+ students took part in the school production of Footloose, with 16 students catching the eye of the talent scout that was in the audience on the opening night! Today, we have enjoyed our end of year assembly and congratulations go to Halliwells for winning the House Cup. I would also like to personally commend the students who were nominated for my Headteacher Award and I decided to award all 4 nominated students this term as it proved too hard to choose an outright winner!

As we say farewell to those staff who are relocating around the country or abroad, moving on to promoted posts and teaching opportunities elsewhere, my thanks go to these colleagues for all they have done for RPHS and we wish them well in their future roles. I would also like to welcome Mrs Mc Inerney back from maternity leave and wish Ms Butler our very best wishes for her maternity leave.

Thank you so much for your continued support this year and thank you to those families who completed the annual survey. We always appreciate your feedback on how we can improve further and we will continue to work hard on delivering the very best outcomes for your children.

I hope that you all have a restful and relaxing summer, and on behalf of all at RPHS, we look forward to seeing you next academic year.

RPHS TENNIS COURTS OFFICIALLY OPENED



Raynes Park High School welcomed Tim Henman OBE to our community event to officially launch our refurbished tennis courts

On the 23rd May we welcomed Tim Henman OBE, Stephen Hammond (Wimbledon MP) and Ross Garrod (Leader of Merton Council) to RPHS to officially open our brand new tennis courts. This exciting afternoon marked a pivotal point in the development of the courts and the support of the Tim Henman Foundation.

The event also welcomed 500 of our local primary school students who took part in the numerous outreach programmes we offer here at RPHS. We are very fortunate that our teachers and partner organisations are committed to making RPHS a standout school for its provision.

We offered a range of activities including tennis with Limitless Tennis, Kicks and Premier League Inspires with Fulham FC Foundation, The Lion King with Ben Warwick and the Drama Dept, and Sublime Science and RPHS Science Chromatography. There were also workshops in

Dance, African drumming, Design & Technology, French and Spanish.

Miss Tapp from Green Lane Primary commented "it was such a wonderful experience and the pupils (and especially me) really appreciated the time Tim took to speak to the GL pupils."

One Burlington student said "I've had so much fun, the African Drumming was great and we got to create our own solo section."

Each time they stepped onto court, they had to demonstrate faultless understanding of the game of tennis and meet the extremely high expectations set by the Championships, which include supporting the world's best players at every point breakdown. Those selected to take part in the Championships are the best of the best from hundreds of other students who apply to join the Ball Boys and Girls programme in and around the borough of Merton, which has made their achievement all the more special.

Way back in September we had numerous students fighting for the 10 trial spots for the school, attending training religiously and pestering family and friends to help them practice as the weeks progressed. It is such a difficult

Following a few weeks of taster training in the summer term, we have already had over 30 Year 8 students show their interest for next year's programme. I want to congratulate all our Ball Boys and Girls, from training to the Championships. They each did an outstanding job at representing Raynes Park High School, and we couldn't be more proud! It was great for several members of teaching staff to get down to watch some tennis over the 2 weeks and catch them in action, truly looking the part. In addition we have had glowing reports back from the Ball Boy and Girls department on how well they did throughout the two weeks. We hope the students enjoyed themselves and got to meet some of their tennis heroes. Again, well done for representing Raynes Park in such a positive light.

South West Writes Competition

We also were given the opportunity for our Year 10 students to enter the creative writing competition South West Writes. This was created by Kingston College in coordination with the literary agency David Higham Associates and Wimbledon Books. Richard Fisher, who visited our school to launch the competition with a select group of creative writers, said that it has been a joy to deliver the competition and witness the enthusiasm, honesty and bravery demonstrated by all the writers who entered. Clara's entry 'Heart' was selected as the overall runner up, with the literary agent Maddalena Cavacuiti stating:

'This submission was an absolute joy to read. There is so much heart and overwhelming emotion expressed in the extract - I really admired the way the writer captured the feelings of first love and selfdiscovery by slipping so seamlessly into metaphors and hyperbole in their storytelling. The final moment, where the love so stunningly described throughout the piece is lost to the writer was incredibly poignant. It's a remarkable skill to have a reader feel so much in so few words, and this extract managed it beautifully."

You were the moment I looked the word 'lesbian' up in the dictionary and realised that there was a place for all my desires, all my forgotten fantasies that I never really forgot at all. Slip a love sonnet into the pocket of your school bag. You'd laugh, ridicule my shaky iambic pentameter. I wouldn't tell you how your words made me melt.

God, I miss your words.

I hate how mine are the only ones left.

It was the summer the earth turned strawberry-blue and even though I remember none of it every single moment is tattooed in the back of my mind. Your lips, your hips, the hair that we cut together. You wanted a wolf cut but I didn't know how to do that so instead I just trimmed the ends and raked stardust through your strands so that they glimmered in the light. I refused to cut my curls so you braided them instead, stopping every now and again to trace my lips with your fingertips and then, when that wasn't enough, your own lips. We were addicted to one another, you and me.

You wore moonlight like lingerie and were the sacred space I had been craving for so long. And now that you're gone I no longer know which god to pray to.

Matthew also received a distinction and was shortlisted for the award. Matthew's design, a safety lock that releases when a car is involved in an accident, was particularly impressive. This lock is designed to function in both regular collisions and accidents involving water, ensuring that drivers can still open the door and get to safety. Matthew's innovative design won the competition.

Design & Technology Association Nominations

Two exceptionally talented D&T students have been nominated for the Design and Technology Association Awards.

Jack in Year 11 has enjoyed numerous D&T accomplishments, including winning the Wizards of the Coast Card Competition, the 2022 Tim Henman D&T Award, the 2024 Tim Henman ICT Award, and multiple Student of the Month D&T awards. His enthusiasm for design



led him to create a games table to meet the GCSE contextual challenge of playing games.

Jasmin in Year 13 studies Art & Design BTEC. She has won the Tim Henman Media Award, multiple Student of the Month D&T awards, the 2023 D&T Student of the Year award, and the 2021 Media Student of the Year award. She has also assisted at various design exhibitions. Jasmin's latest project involves creating an infinity mirror using reflected lights.

Both Jack and Jasmin have a good chance of winning their respective awards, and we eagerly await the results.

SCIENCE UPDATE

This term has been a busy one for the Science Department, with clubs and competitions providing opportunities for success for students beyond the classroom

Biology Olympiad

The Biology Olympiad competition consisted of two, 25-minute multiple choice papers which were taken online, under staff supervised exam conditions. Questions were set on the school curriculum, but the competition also rewarded those students whose knowledge of the subject had been increased by reading books and magazines, watching natural history programmes, taking notice of the news media for items of biological interest, and who were generally aware of our natural flora and fauna.

Out of 25 participants at Raynes Park, there were the following awards: five Commended, seven Highly Commended, 1 Bronze (Matthew), two Silver (Christina and Maryam) and two Gold (Muhammad and Bowie). Achieving a Gold award puts students in the top 5% of all participants in the world, which is a huge achievement considering 45,400 students took part. A huge well done to everyone.



YEAR 10 FRENCH TRIP

A two-day visit to Dunkirk gave our Year 10 students a chance to practice their language skills and explore the local area



On Monday 24th June, 13 Year 10 students gathered outside school at 5am to set off on their first trip abroad with the MFL department, this time heading to Dunkirk in northern France. Accompanied by Ms Pigott, Ms Burkin and Mr Oldridge, and travelling in the school minibus, we went down to Folkestone to take the shuttle across the Channel, and after a short drive at the other end in France, we reached our destination before midday.

We started off by exploring the beautiful sculpture park right next to our hostel, where we were using the French signs to work out what the art represented.

Then we headed to the beach for a walk along the promenade in the sunshine. Students found the perfect reason to practice their French here: purchasing ice cream. Meanwhile they were also completing a photo scavenger hunt, and keeping a look out for categories such as a French football shirt, most intriguing ice cream flavour, and a photo of a teacher buying cheese.

Later that afternoon we paid a visit to the Operation Dynamo museum, which commemorates the events that took place during the Second World War in Dunkirk.

After another beach visit and dinner at the hostel, we took an after-dinner walk out to see one of Dunkirk's lighthouses and came back for a well-earned night's sleep after the 5am start.

Day two started with breakfast at our hostel, and we headed straight to Marché Malo-les-Bains,

one of the open-air markets in the area, situated in a picturesque square with a bandstand in the middle. Students finally had the chance to tick off 'teacher buying cheese' from their photo scavenger hunt, and we all spent an hour perusing the stalls full of clothing, bags, watches, bracelets, fresh fruit and veg, saucisson and more. The year 10s were bravely using their French, even negotiating exchanges for items or asking to try things. Before heading to the beach for a final picnic we couldn't help but pay a visit to a patisserie to pick up some beautiful sweet treats. One student described using her French as scary, but then she felt so proud of herself afterwards.

Back at the hostel we collected the picnic they prepared for us and went back to Maloles-Bains beach one more time. After a small confrontation with some seagulls and one last moment in the sunshine it was time to start the journey back to Raynes Park High School. The journey home went along with no hitches and we got back to school at 6:05pm.

Thank you to Mr Oldridge for his driving on the way there and back, and Ms Burkin and Ms Alviz for their support in organising.



I am so proud of all the students as they all got involved and behaved so well, they were excellent ambassadors of RPHS and I'm sure this will be a trip that we remember for a long time!










ENRICHMENT WEEK

The girls group who successfully pitched their social action project to a leading panel were able to put it to action. The project was centred on young people's mental health and the actions that can be taken to support them. They had planned a Mini Olympic activity carousel for Burlington Junior School Year 5 pupils, with Nancy delivering a Mental Health workshop as one of the activities. The girls were fortunate enough to deliver their project at Motspur Park in the Fulham Training Dome. They led their individual activities brilliantly, with Richmond from FFC commenting, "They were so professional and so engaging with the younger children". Mr Blow Deputy Head of Burlington echoed the statement and that "it was great for the Burlington pupils to see the opportunities available at secondary school."




